

"PSSARP begins - A European project on affectivity in the penal system"

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Dear readers,

It is with great excitement that we announce the official launch of the Erasmus+ project PSSARP

- **Psychological Strategies for the Sexual and Affective Re-education of Prisoners!** Together with partners from Italy, Romania and Germany, we will be devoting the next two years to a topic that has long been overshadowed - **affectivity in the prison system**.

Whether love, closeness, partnership or family ties: People in prison remain emotionally sentient beings. However, European prison conditions leave little room for what is essential for social rehabilitation - functioning relationships. This is precisely where our project comes in.

Who we are - and why we do it

Behind PSSARP are:

- → **Europe Unlimited e.V. (Germany)** with many years of experience in educational projects in the prison system,
- → **Igor Vitale International (Italy)** an institute with psychological expertise in forensic resocialization,
- → Penitenciarul București Jilava (Romania) a correctional facility with its own specialized department for social reintegration.

Our goals:

- → Exploring the affective needs of prisoners and their families
- → Develop training materials for professionals
- → Developing Europe-wide recommendations for an affectivity-friendly prison policy

First visits - three countries, three impressions

Bremen Prison (Germany):

In discussions with prison staff and educators, it quickly became clear that resocialization works best when bonds with partners and children are maintained. However, there is still a lack of structural options, such as retreats for families. "We do our best - but without political support, we reach our limits," says one social worker.

Jilava (Romania):

There is already an established system for "intimate visits" in the Romanian prison system. Daniel Zaharia, deputy prison warden, emphasizes:

"Affectivity is not a bonus - it is a right. Our experience shows: Those who can allow closeness are more willing to take responsibility for their behavior."

Sardinia (Italy):

In open prison in Sardinia, we experience a completely different atmosphere: day release, regular contact with the family and personal development are the main focus here. "Seeing the person - not just the offender," says Igor Vitale.

"In a system that allows empathy, there are no relapses, but second chances."

Next steps

In the coming months:

- → start qualitative interviews with over 100 inmates and relatives in all three countries
- → we are developing an online course for prison professionals
- → we are preparing the first transnational workshop in Bucharest (Romania)
